Full Participation in Our Courses: The Pilot & Beyond

One important step in the process of achieving full participation is to create more inclusive classrooms and courses that engage a diverse range of students. Four departments are currently piloting the use of a tool developed by the Summer Working Group on Full Participation. This tool will help individuals and departments assess whether, and to what extent, they are already using methods to achieve full participation and where and how they might improve. Come hear members of the working group and the pilot departments talk about how the process is going and share your ideas about how we can move forward across the curriculum.
